We live in a service oriented society. That means we often evaluate businesses on how well they serve us. Think about how we talk to others about restaurants. We often rank them based upon the quality of the food and the service. How often have you heard (or said), “The food was pretty good, but the service was so bad, I will never go back”? Think about that. We do not have to hunt or gather that food. We do not have to clean it or cook it. We do not have to clean up the mess afterward. And still we find reasons to complain about it. So, are we that spoiled?

Here’s the real danger. We can bring that “spoiled” mentality to church with us. We can become disillusioned or frustrated because we feel like the church is not serving us as well as it ought. Wait! We ARE the church. The church is not some entity separate from us that is supposed to serve us. Further, Jesus taught that being the church is about being servants to others rather than being served by others (Mt. 20:20-28; Jn. 13:1-16).

I need to rise up over a spoiled mentality and look for ways to serve.

Theology Born from Evangelism

An interesting thing occurred to me as I contemplated the great commission (Mt. 28:18-20), and the first efforts to obey it (Acts). Jesus told the apostles to make disciples of all nations. While it took additional revelation from God (Acts 10) before they fully grasped that aspect of the commission, the disciples did eventually go to “all nations” to make disciples. Paul urged people to turn away from all the gods they were serving and serve the one true, living God (Acts 14:13-18). When Paul was in Athens, where people served a variety of gods, he urged them to repent and serve the God of heaven (Acts 17:30-31). The very nature of the commission given by Jesus and the obedience to it by the first Christians proclaims an important truth about Christianity.

We live in a culture that calls upon everyone to accept as true and right what others believe. That is, the call to coexist is more than a political call. It is a spiritual call as well. It is one thing to accept a person’s right to believe whatever he or she chooses to believe. It is another thing entirely to accept that choice as true and right. The right to choose whatever one wants includes the right to be completely wrong. The demand of some in our current culture is to accept each choice as equally right and true. The commission of Jesus rejects this philosophy.

Now, please understand, there is far more in the New Testament than just evangelism that denies the current American religious pluralism. But, the great commission, by itself, is sufficient to deny the truth of pluralism.

Why would Jesus order his followers to convert all nations if their current religions were okay? Why would Paul urge others to turn away from their current faith if they could be saved by it?

The truth of the matter is that all religions are not the same. It is not just about people choosing the religion that soothes them and satisfies them in some way. It is about the one true God, who made the heavens and the earth and everything in them. There is a God who is real, and there is only one. There are many things that people call gods, but there is only one real, true God (1 Cor. 8:4-6). To accept any other idea is to deny that one true God. This is why Jesus gave the great commission – he died so that people could be saved. All people need to hear that message; otherwise they are lost – no matter what else they believe. It is not about the political right people have to believe whatever they want. It is not about Christians thinking they are better or above everyone else. It is about the one real, true, loving God who wants “all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth” (1 Tim. 2:4). ALL people need to come to the knowledge of THE truth. ALL people need to be saved – and the only way to be saved is through Jesus (1 Tim. 2:5-6; Acts 4:12; Jn. 14:6).

Then, in my hands, they die.*

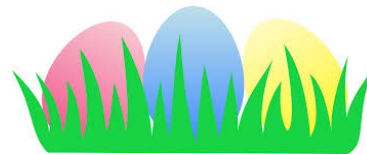
*If I cannot unfold a rosebud,
